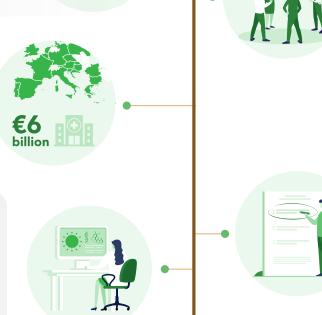
In the face of the COVID-19 crisis, the European Commission's top priority is safeguarding the health and well-being of its citizens, using all the tools at its disposal.

The EC has taken a multi-faceted approach:

The EC set up an advisory panel on coronavirus composed of seven expert epidemiologists and virologists from EU Member States to formulate science-based EU response guidelines and coordinate risk management measures.



The EU Solidarity for Health Initiative was launched on 2 April, which is aimed at directly supporting the health care systems of EU Member States. It will provide for €6 billion to meet the needs of European health systems.



An effective crisis coordination strategy that includes:



Video conferences at the level of the **European Council**



Regular discussions with **Health Ministers**



Meetings of the **Health Security** Committee

And allows for:

Rapid exchange of information

Extensive monitoring

Coordination of response measures

In addition, notifications of serious cross-border health threats are made through the Early Warning and Response System.

The Commission adopted **guidelines** to support Member States in need, with the following aims and provisions:

Arranging for patient mobility across borders

Facilitating cross-border medical assistance

Relieving the burden on national health systems

Steps for the **reimbursement** of healthcare costs



Encouraging the use of bilateral/regional agreements

Ensuring high-quality coronavirus testing

for testing kit quality

Fight against counterfeit devices

Coordinate fair distribution of kits and devices
